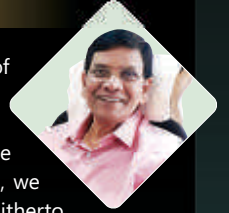

## From CEO's Desk



Dear Donors, Supporters and  
Well-wishers of our cause,  
Greetings from Manasa Institute!

Children are the hope and the future of society. Investing in physical and psychological well-being of children is imperative for any nation's progress.

Health of the mother is a pre-requisite for health of the child. Most causes of ill health and disability in children are rooted in maternal ill health or abnormal delivery or both. Infections, toxicity, malnutrition, accidental injuries, emotional trauma during childhood are the other important causes. During this decade there is a significant improvement in maternal and child health parameters in India; yet, we are not better than our neighbouring countries like Bangladesh and Nepal which are poorer and have few health facilities and doctors. As a nation with fastest growing economy, we all have responsibility to ensure the access and affordability to basic health services for 'All' through promotion of institutional deliveries, maternal and child nutrition, immunisation and pollution free food and environment. When every child with high risk criteria gets an opportunity to be screened at birth; the risk of disability decreases significantly and if all the children with impairments could get access to treatment, early intervention, rehab therapy services and barrier free environment they can put to use residual abilities optimally for their independent living, empowerment and inclusion.

The initiatives of Manasa Institute are aimed at making a difference in the lives of children who are victims of socio economic and health inequalities and suffer with malnutrition, health vulnerabilities, chronic illnesses and disabilities. Our focus is to take up sustainable efforts by reaching the unreached through participatory methods and address serious gaps with training and research on one hand and advocacy and community health and rehabilitation services on the other.

This year, with all your unstinted support we have done many things; few of them are here:

1. Trained over two hundred front line health workers and over a three hundred teachers, parents and social media activists.
2. Published a research on "Health issues among the Persons with Intellectual Disabilities.
3. Organised three advocacy programmes.
4. Started Vitamin-A project to prevent blindness and improve immunity among the children.
5. Multivitamin supply program for pregnant women.
6. Established 'Neurodevelopmental clinic' for children with developmental disabilities and a 'cell for Needs assessment & counselling' for parents of children with disabilities.
7. Started delivering Community Based Rehabilitation programme.

We hope you will keep strengthening us to reach more needy children.

## Child Health Services

- This year as part of Maternal and Child Health Services ; we have started the following new programmes:
- Child Health Screening, Nutrition & Deworming
- Multivitamin supplementation for pregnant women
- 'Vitamin-A' supplementation programme for children to prevent vitamin A deficiency related blindness and strengthen their immunity.
- Deworming for Children to prevent worm related diarrhoea, anaemia and malnutrition.
- Organising community maternal and child health screening camps.
- Child Health Counselling services

# Neurodevelopmental Clinic



Neurodevelopmental Clinic (NDC) has been organised in November 2017. Range of services provided in NDC are Screening high -risk infants and children with developmental delays and impairments and provide Early Intervention Services for children with Cognitive deficits such as Mental Retardation and Sensory-motor disorders and impairments like Visual impairment, Hearing Impairment, Speech Impairment, Weakness in limbs and Syndromes and disorders like Autism, Down syndrome, Pervasive developmental Disorders, ADHD, Neuro-developmental disorders, Cerebral Palsies, Multiple Sclerosis, Muscular dystrophies and Learning disabilities and memory impairments. Screening at birth particularly Audiological (Hearing) Screening/ Assessment and Developmental Assessment, Speech & Language therapy, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Psychological Assessment and Behaviour Modification and Cognitive Therapy & Special Education services. Parent Education & Counselling Service is the one of the main activities of NDC .

Regularly 25-30 children with Neurodevelopmental disabilities are availing various health and rehab therapy services in the NDC.

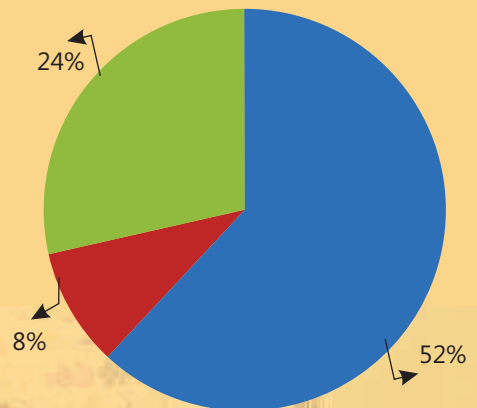






## Special Education for Children with Disabilities

Manasa Institute has been running a Special School for the Children with Intellectual Disabilities from past over 25 years, today we have 80 plus children in the special school, who have access to all the health and rehabilitation therapy services and periodical parents counselling.

# Manasa Vikasa Gamyam - 2022

## In collaboration with Sri Gopikrishna Infrastructure Pvt. Ltd.

It all started with the visit of MANASA by Sri Kanumuri Gopala Raju Garu, Managing Director, Sri Gopikrishna Infrastructure Pvt. Ltd (SGIPL) on 14th September 2017 when he offered to support Manasa financially and with managerial inputs under SGIPL's Corporate Social Responsibility programme.

Accordingly '**Manasa Vikasa Gamyam-2022**' (MVG 2022) programme was conceived and inaugurated on 13th October 2017, envisioning future development of MANASA into a full-fledged Institute engaged in right proportion in the delivery of services, development of human resources, models, technology etc., discovery of solutions to problems, documentation and dissemination, merely not in the area of special educational services to the students with intellectual disabilities, but covering all disabilities as an inclusive model. His daughter Ms. Neelima, Director, SGIPL, and Dr. L. Govinda Rao, President, SGIPL, who was former Director NIMH & NIEPMD, Govt. of India, have played a very key role in giving a shape to the concept and plan and are instrumental in the whole process. Subsequently Sri R. Ramkrishna Murthy was appointed as the Director of MANASA.





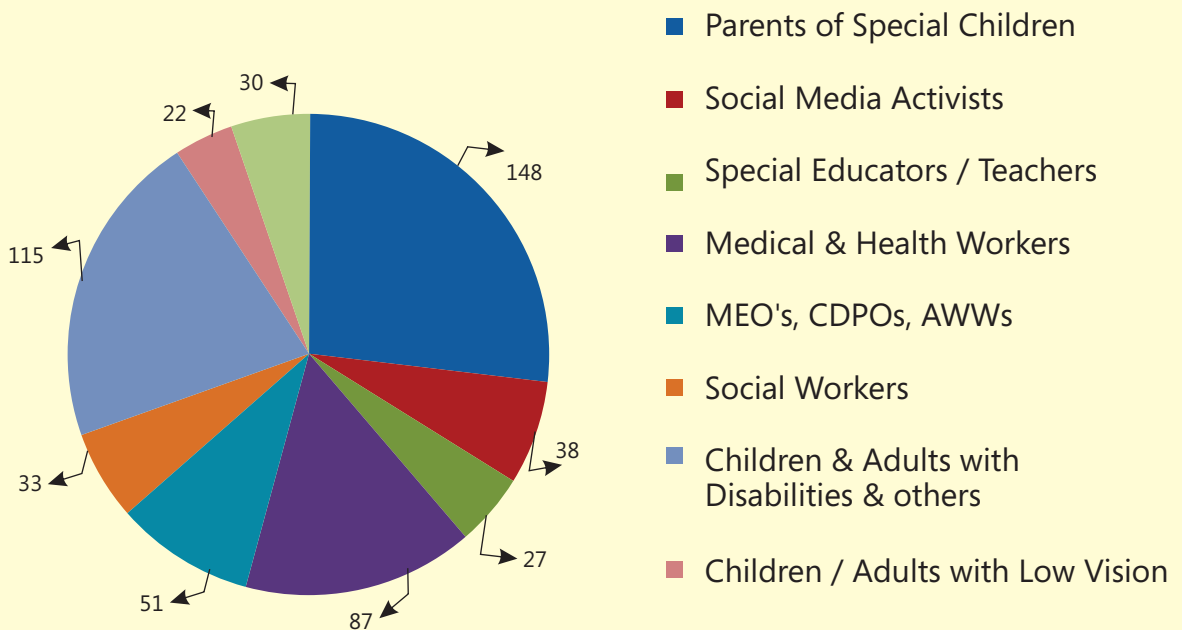
## Training - Change Makers

Whatever the state of Policies and Systems, ultimately it is the individuals who bring real progressive change in the society. Among them all, the people who work in the front line at the grass root level are the real change makers. Without them no change percolates; no fruits of change can see the light.

Therefore we have been training front line health workers ( ANMs, ASHAs), Teachers, Social Media Activists, NGO leaders and social workers to foster adequate knowledge and skills on various issues relating to child health and disability empowerment.

This year, we have trained over 500 such change makers in collaboration with the Telangana and Andhra Pradesh and received overwhelming positive feedback and requests from participants, other NGOs and departments to conduct more such training programmes.

## Research - Contextual Issues

This year, we have started three research programmes relating to child health and disability; one of them was presented in the International Conference on 'Evidence in Global Disability and Health' organized by London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine and IIPH. This study highlighted the grievous state of health vulnerabilities in children and adults with intellectual disabilities and emphasised the need of a system for profiling health information of people with Intellectual Disabilities for better planning and organising health services and also proposed an outline of mechanism by which an organisation or state government can develop a suitable process.



## Case study

### From Vattinagulapalli...

On 14-12-2017, as part of our CBR field visit we were crossing a tribal hamlet called Vattinagulapalli near Bhadrachalam in the borders of Andhra Pradesh and Telangana states. There was a road block; by the side few children were playing in the sand. One of them found to be failing to communicate and play with the others. When we screened him at the spot we realised that he can't speak. Upon detailed examination after getting him along with his parents to Manasa Institute, Hyderabad, we diagnosed that he had Pervasive Developmental Disorder and even needed a Genetic testing. Now the challenge is providing him early intervention services for few months to years and as there is no such facility in any of the nearby towns of his village. The family can't afford to lose their livelihood by relocating to Hyderabad.





## Case study

### Meet Mrs. Yadamma....

13 years ago Mrs. Yadamma, a mother of two children with Cerebral Palsy had come to Manasa Institute with a lot of hope, she admitted her children for rehabilitation and subsequently she liked the activities of the organisation and have joined as Care Taker in the Manasa Special School to make her livelihood. Her son Mr. Janardhan has Moderate Multiple Disabilities (C. P., V. I, H. I, O. D. & M. R.), partially dependant and her daughter Ms. Vaishnavi is suffering with Severe Physical & Intellectual Disability (CP& M. R.) and completely dependent. Recently all the therapy services being provided to Mr. Janardhan are focussed on self-care and make him help his sister. Now he is gradually started helping her; interestingly he is also showing his interest in helping other children in Neuro Developmental Clinic.

# Success Stories

## ● Story of Baby Ananya

Baby Ananya, aged 7 years was brought to Manasa Institute in the December, 2017. The chief complaints were that the child doesn't speak and behave like normal children and parents' attempts to admit her in normal school was failed as the schools have denied giving her admission. Detailed assessment of the child revealed that she has Moderate Level of Intellectual Disability with lack of communication, socialisation and self-help skills. The parents were counselled about her condition and explained the Do's and Don'ts to them and she was admitted into Manasa Special School with regular Speech & language therapy sessions. With periodical evaluation, consistent team work and developing strategies to improve her communication and behaviour got satisfactory results by June 2018. In the month of July a delegation of special school reached out to the Government Primary School (Mohan Nagar) located near by the Institute. After several discussions with the Government School staff to give admission to this child they have agreed but expressed a lot of doubts and apprehensions. All the Government School staff and students were invited to Manasa Institute on 30th June 2018 for an half a day orientation. After understanding the technicalities, challenges and need for giving admission to her, the staff and children have welcomed Baby Ananya into their School. Now she is in "Inclusive Education" in a normal school.



## ● Story of Master Sai Charan Tej

Sai Charan Tej, a child with Moderate Intellectual Disability due to Downs Syndrome, he was admitted in Manasa Special School in the July 2017 and after one year of intensive rehabilitation therapy he was successfully included in the normal school on 6th July 2018.





# Success Stories

## Meet Master Shishir

The son of Mrs. Rajyalaxmi, Mast. Shishir Kumar was diagnosed with Dandy Walker Syndrome at 7 months of age. Dandy-Walker syndrome is a rare group of congenital brain malformations. It is caused due to failure to develop the cerebellar vermis which blocks the CSF circulation. He could not sit and stand, later it was found that he also had Moderate Intellectual Disability and Speech and Language Impairment. After visiting many doctors and rehab centres at the age of 6 years, Shishir was brought to Manasa Institute. Here the treatment was involved Physical therapy, Speech and Language therapy and Special Education from over past three years. Gradually Mrs. Rajyalaxmi found interest in special education and she is now pursuing B. Ed. Special Education (MR) while working in Manasa Special School as an Assistant Teacher. Now, Shishir is able to walk on his own and care himself well. This year he is ready for inclusive education.



# Success Stories

**Mr. Chandra Reddy** (a person with Moderate Intellectual Disability, aged 35 years) was given admission into vocational training (in Office Assistance) in June 2018 and by the August 2018 he was job ready and was recruited as an office Assistant in a software company called Adroit InfoTech Ltd. in Hyderabad. Now he is the bread winner of his family.



**Mr. Murali**, (a person with Moderate Intellectual Disability aged 31 years) was given admission in vocational training (in Office Assistance) in June 2018 and he is now ready for employment.

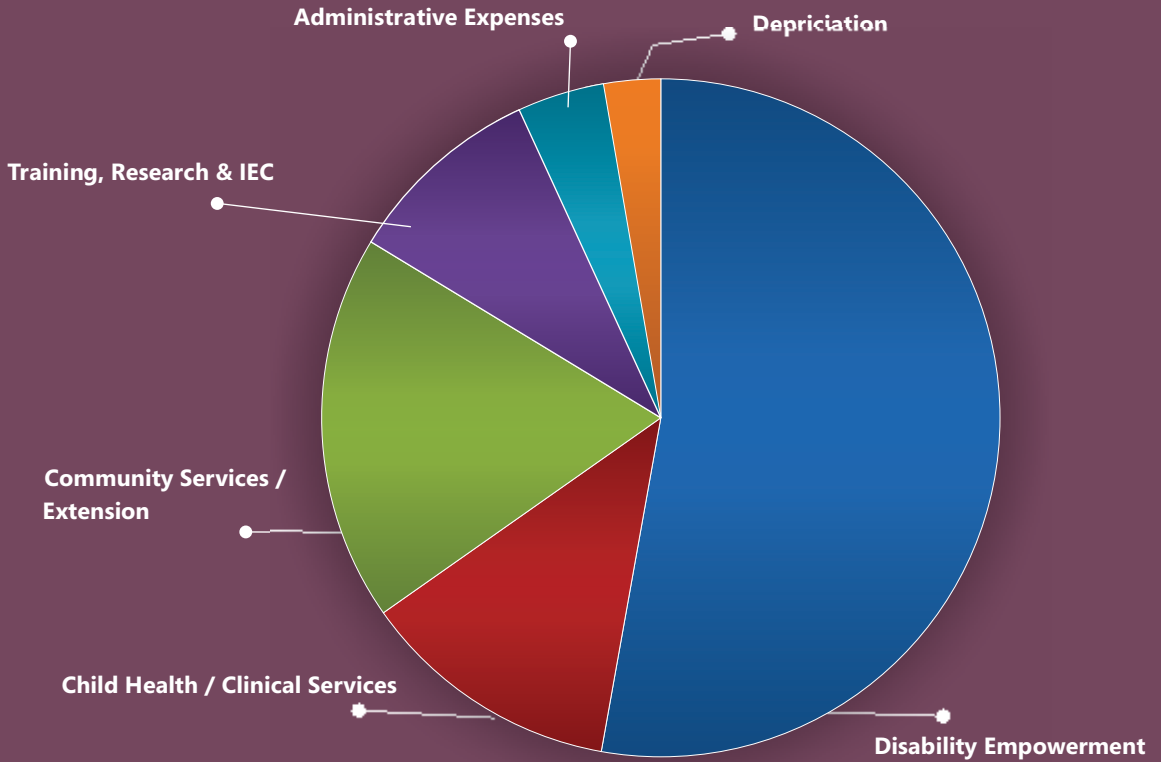
